1. SCRIBE

"Scribe" is an abstract sculpture inspired by ink well and quill.

2. LIBRARY KIDS

This artist was inspired by the innocence of children sitting together and reading a book.

3. A TOTEM OF SPRING

"A Totem of Spring" is a joyful celebration of the amazing growth in nature. Colorful birds, flowers, and leaves are hand built in clay and invite the viewer to appreciate the gorgeous wonders of spring.

10. MYSTICAL GALAXY CHIMES

"Mystical Galaxy Chimes" is a work from Mr. Bearden's Cathedral Series. It's an arrangement of various shapes on vertical rods. When touched by hand or the breeze, an other-worldly orchestra resounds.

Do you hear anything when this piece moves? Have you ever been to a cathedral?

9. COLEOPTILE

"Coleoptile is the term for the first leaf which provides a protective sheath for the new growth. The work slowly rises from an overlapped fold at the base which is neatly held in place with exposed button welds, then gradually expands to an opening that beckons to the space beyond. It speaks to change, growth, new beginnings."

Do you think this looks like a leaf? Why or why not?





4. CONEFLOWER DUO

"Coneflower Duo" is made of abstract sculptures inspired by cone flowers that also detect and blink to signify detection of cosmic particles via solar powered electronics and LED light.

What does this sculpture look like to you? Where would you put this if you owned it?



Palimpsest is writing material (as a parchment or tablet, in this case a sculpture) used one or more times after earlier writing has been erased.

Can you read what is written on this sculpture? What do you think it means?

5. THISTLE BE THE ONE

"Thistle Be the One" is a larger than life glorification of one of nature's most beautiful plants. Most people would think of thistles as nothing more than a noxious weed. We are challenged not only to be more open minded and resourceful but also to reexamine what is a resource and what is a nuisance."

6. NATURE'S QUINTET

"Nature's Quintet" is based on the Columbine Flower, native to the Midwest. The enlarged petal forms create a simplistic, otherworldly beauty. Their entangled, arching forms remind us of the petal's movement in the wind. The harmonious relationship between each petal mirrors the delicate movement of dance or music, each part positioned in tandem with others. While dancing on the wind, they sing.
