

Make sure you have a carbon monoxide alarm

What is carbon monoxide?

Carbon monoxide or CO is often called the "Invisible Killer" because it's a colorless, odorless, poisonous gas. More than 150 people in the U.S. die every year from accidental non-fire related CO poisoning associated with consumer products, such as generators, and faulty or improperly used or incorrectly vented fuel-burning appliances (furnaces, stoves, water heaters and fireplaces).

Know the symptoms of CO poisoning

Because CO is odorless, colorless and otherwise undetectable to the human senses, people may not know that they are being exposed. Initial symptoms of low to moderate CO poisoning are similar to the flu (but without the fever):

- Headache
- Fatigue
- Shortness of breath
- Nausea
- Dizziness

High level CO poisoning results in progressively more severe symptoms:

- Mental confusion
- Vomiting
- Loss of muscular coordination
- Loss of consciousness
- Ultimately, death



Learn what you can do to protect your family from the dangers of CO

- Install and maintain CO alarms inside your home to provide early warning of CO.
- ◆ CO alarms should be installed on every level of the home outside each separate sleeping area.
- ♦ Choose a CO alarm that has the label of a recognized testing laboratory.
- ♦ Use portable generators outdoors in well-ventilated areas away from all doors, windows and vents.
- ♦ Make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove and fireplace are clear of snow and debris.
- Remove vehicles from the garage immediately after starting.
- ◆ Test CO alarms at least once a month.



If the CO alarm sounds, you must get fresh air. Move outdoors by an open window or near an open door. Make sure *everyone* in the home (including pets) get to fresh air. Call the fire department from a fresh air location and stay there until emergency personnel arrive.

2015 APWA Operator Training and Roadeo Event

No doubt about it: Winter is on its way!

Did you know that the City of West Des Moines has more than 770 lane miles of streets? In order to keep you safe, we take a very serious approach to snow and ice control.

Priority of Snow Removal

- #1 Major Arterial Streets The major street network must be kept open to provide a continual transportation system for police, fire and rescue squads.
- #2 Collector Streets
- #3 Residential Streets and Public Sidewalks
- #4 Cul-de-sacs, Alleys and City trails

Plan Now for a Parking Ban

To accomplish snow removal, a Snow Emergency Parking Ban may be implemented by the Public Works Department. Vehicles must be removed from all City Streets, alleys and City-owned parking areas when the Snow Emergency Parking Ban is in effect. Vehicles parked in these areas are subject to being towed and/or ticketed (\$50).

An update on the Emerald Ash Borer

y now, most everyone knows the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) was confirmed last year in a residential ash tree in West Des Moines. Fortunately, the City had plans in place to chemically treat public ash trees. Treatment of 710 trees, approximately 76% of all ash trees on city-owned property, was initiated in May and completed in late July.

City staff injected a 4 percent solution of emamectin benzoate, which has been proven to be nearly 100 percent effective at killing EAB larvae and adult beetles over the course of two years. The treated trees will be re-evaluated in 2017 to determine whether or not it makes sense to treat them again.

The effects of an EAB infestation start out slowly. The level of damage to untreated trees will likely be more advanced two years from now, but history shows that 4 years from now, EAB populations will finally reach a tipping point. Trees that were perfectly healthy one year may die the following year. Within 6 to 10 years, nearly all *untreated* ash trees will be killed by EAB.



Private property owners are urged not to become complacent. If you have an ash tree on your property, you are encouraged to make plans to begin treatment in the spring of 2016 or plan to remove the tree in the near future. Be sure to get multiple prices from reputable local tree companies prior to any tree treatment or removal.

Low income energy assistance program

Applications for the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) for the 2015-2016 program year will be taken by the WDM Human Services office beginning November 1, 2015, and continuing through April 30, 2016.

The LIHEAP program assists qualifying low-income lowa homeowners and renters by paying a portion of their primary heating costs. This program is not designed to pay a household's total energy costs.

WDM Human Services is located at 139 6th St. Applications will be accepted on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays from 8:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. and on Wednesdays from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. (noon). For better service, applicants are encouraged to schedule an appointment in advance by calling (515) 222-3660. Walk-ins will be accepted during application hours.




2015 Sidewalk Program

The area of the program this year is primarily I-35 to 98th Street from University Ave. to Ashworth Road. Residents were given approximately 75 days to make repairs or let the City perform the repair (in which case a property owner should figure \$12.50 per square foot for a 4-inch thick



sidewalk and \$14.06 per square foot for a 6-inch thick sidewalk). The project has been awarded and a mid-November completion date has been set. Staff has received 193 calls about the program from property owners. The contractor is approximately 30% complete with the project.



2014 Sidewalk Program

Staff sent approximately 833 notifications to property owners in the general area of 19th Street to Valley West Drive from E.P. True Parkway to University Avenue. Staff reviewed the area in March 2015 based on the revised defect criteria and the project has now been reduced to 329 affected properties. The contractor is approximately 30% complete with the project.

2015 PCC Reconstruction Project (2nd Street) – Railroad Avenue to Walnut Street

This project will reconstruct 2nd Street from Railroad Avenue to Walnut Street. Sod restoration has been completed and the contractor is finishing up a few minor items.



Construction Updates

2015 PCC Patching Program

This project involves concrete patching on Westown Parkway, 60th Street, University Avenue, Ashworth Road and a few other locations within the City. The contractor should finish up working on University Avenue soon. In addition, some partial depth patches will be placed on Westown Parkway adjacent to Hy-Vee corporate headquarters.



West Des Moines Receives Dallas County Foundation Grant for New Pedestrian Signal

Traffic Engineer Jim Dickinson applied for and received a grant from the Dallas County Foundation for a new pedestrian signal crossing at the intersection of 65th & Ashworth Road.

The new signal crossing is a HAWK pedestrian signal, which stands for High-intensity Activated crossWalk beacon.

The signal remains dark for traffic until a pedestrian pushes the button at the crossing.



Once the button is pressed, the signal changes to: 1.) a flashing yellow light; 2.) a steady yellow light; and 3.) a solid red light. The red signal stops traffic and allows pedestrians to safely cross the street.
