

THE MAYOR'S COLUMN



The heart of historic West Des Moines is well known for many things, especially its eclectic shopping, vibrant farmers market that attracts large crowds and more than 100 vendors to Fifth Street every Thursday evening from early May through late September, and an established surrounding neighborhood that has been home to many residents for generations.

But many people don't know that West Des Moines began in 1893 as Valley Junction. It wasn't until a vote on Dec. 7, 1937 — the third such vote by residents — that Valley Junction changed its name to West Des Moines.

Last September, we started searching for a firm to assist us in the creation of a master plan to ensure the continued vitality of the area, which is bounded by First Street (Highway 28) to the east, Railroad Avenue to the south, and Grand Avenue to the north and west. After considering several proposals, we selected Teska Associates to lead this effort.

We are fortunate that West Des Moines is able to conduct this effort from a position of strength — strength that only comes from a strong local economy and citizens who truly care about the area's vitality. Our intent is to take an already thriving area to the next level by working to ensure we're planning ahead and identifying needs and resources.

Since January, city officials and staff have held three workshops to gather public input and determine what residents would like to see in both the commercial and residential areas. Teska has done an excellent job of engaging people to talk about the area and identify new ways to keep the neighborhood and business district fresh and appealing.

Input has come through focus groups, public workshops, community events, online polls and even an ideas chalkboard. These interactive tools have created a sense of excitement among participants who are thrilled to help shape the future of an important part of our community.

When asked what people would like to see in historic West Des Moines, we heard a variety of outstanding suggestions ranging from a request for more upper-story apartments and condos to more bistro-style outdoor cafes, restaurants and rooftop patios. We also heard about bicycle and parking needs and a few areas that need some additional care and attention.

This variety of perspectives provided helpful feedback that is greatly appreciated.

As we work on this plan, our focus will include a look at the business mix to see if a strong food and beverage component might strengthen the area's appeal. We'll also look at the residential mix to see if we have the right blend of single family homes, multifamily homes and rentals. Parking needs are important, too, because we want to make sure we're providing adequate access for pedestrians, bike riders and transit users.

Another critical component of the area is the streetscape, and whether or not the landscaping, walkability and lighting is welcoming to visitors and meets residents' needs. The team also is addressing the reuse of the Phenix Elementary School site, which is ripe for redevelopment.

No plan would be complete without specific implementation strategies that include an analysis of potential sources and uses of funding to support suggested improvements.

Our goal is to have the City Council take action on a final draft of the master plan in September. In the meantime, I encourage you to visit the project website at www. historicwdm.com to share your ideas and see how far we have come in gathering ideas to take historic West Des Moines to the next level.

WATER QUALITY IMPROVEMENTS IN WEST DES MOINES

NEW in 2016 -Woodland Hills Park Water Quality Improvements

The City has received another IDALS Water Quality Initiative grant in the amount of \$65,500 for several projects in Woodland Hills Park, a new neighborhood park located at 1230 South 95th Street. The Parks & Recreation Department is excited about the following project components:

Bioretention Cells – Several bioretention cells and associated native plantings are being installed as part of the park's stormwater management system. Benefits of these biocells include increased infiltration of rainwater, improved water quality, increased aesthetics, improved wildlife habitat, lower chemical use, and educational opportunities.

Soil Quality Restoration & Native **Seeding** – We will be improving the compacted clay soil on the site by deep aerating and applying compost to about 4 acres. A native seed mix will be planted on approximately 2 acres of the park. The main benefit of soil quality restoration is improved water infiltration which will decrease runoff of stormwater.



Permeable Pavement - The new parking lot in Woodland Hills Park won't be a typical concrete lot. It will include an area of permeable pavement that will collect as much rainwater as possible so it can infiltrate rather than runoff. Any water passing through the permeable pavement system will be much cleaner.

These water quality improvements are part of a larger development project that includes a shelter, restroom building, and playground. Construction is planned to begin in late August. City Campus Pond Watershed Improvements Project Completed!

In 2015, the City received a \$33,000 grant from the Iowa Department of Agriculture & Land Stewardship (IDALS) Water Quality Initiative program for the City Campus Pond Watershed Improvement

project. Goals of the project included demonstrating ways to reduce runoff and water pollution, improving the pond's water quality, and ultimately creating a great place for urban fishing.



COMMUNITY COMPLIANCE

Formerly known as Code Enforcement

Potential violations of City Code are now being processed by the Community Compliance division of West Des Moines Public Works. The following list identifies common requests handled by Community Compliance:

- Junk cars (inoperable, not properly licensed, parts missing, etc.) on private property
- Auto parts stored outside on private property
- Vehicles and trailers parked on unpaved surfaces
- Junk and debris in the yard
- Weeds and/or grass growing to a height of 10" or more
- Snow and ice removal from sidewalks


If an investigation by a Community Compliance Specialist determines there is a compliance issue, the property owner will be contacted and given an appropriate amount of time to correct the violation prior to further action by the City.

Safe Drinking Water is No Accident; Go Ahead and Toast the Tap

he next time you stroll over to the faucet to tap all the water you need for drinking, cooking, bathing and so on; you might want to think about how powerful and coveted that simple act really is.

We spend seconds walking a few feet, while women and children living in Africa and Asia walk an average of 3.7 miles a day to collect



Water in one form or another powers almost everything that matters to a community, yet we often take it for granted, assuming safe, quality drinking water will flow from the tap whenever we want it. It's important for us to feel secure in our water systems, but it's equally important for us to understand that safe, reliable drinking water doesn't just happen.

The ongoing public outrage surrounding the toxic lead levels found in the drinking water in Flint, Michigan, demonstrates in life-threatening detail the importance of diligent and proper water treatment.

During the past year, improperly treated water adversely affected thousands of Flint's citizens, most of whom had implicitly trusted the quality and safety of their water. As the story of Flint, with

its political ramifications and alleged malfeasance by water regulators and city officials unfolded, media and community advocates began to call into question the integrity of all water utilities and regulators. If it can happen in Flint, could it happen here?

That's a valid question and one that deserves to be answered.

Let's start with a few things everyone should know about lead and water:

- 1. Lead contaminated water cannot be detected by sight, smell or taste. The only way to detect lead toxicity in water is with a specially prescribed test. Occasional discoloration or seasonal changes in water taste and odor are not indicators of lead within drinking water.
- 2. Lead is not a product of water treatment, nor is it found in most source water. West Des Moines residents receive water drawn from deep and shallow wells as well as the Des Moines and Raccoon rivers. These water sources do not contain lead.
- 3. Toxic levels of lead typically occur when the metal leaches into the system from old-style service lines. Although much less common, high levels of lead can also result from the corrosion of plumbing, fittings and fixtures in homes built before 1986.





In West Des Moines, we have no known lead service lines, and our source water is free of lead. For more information about this issue, see Why What Happened in Flint, Michigan Won't Happen to West Des Moines H2O on our website.

Central Iowans have probably thought more about water this year than in the previous three decades. Drinking water quality is now front and center legislatively, and it's even gaining currency in coffee meetings and cocktail conversations.

As an engineer and water treatment professional, I see the spotlight cast on municipal water as an opportunity. Safe drinking water greatly contributes to our overall public health and the high standard of living we enjoy in the metro area. Easily accessible, potable water is essential to human development and a major asset in economic development.

My hope is that this newfound awareness and appreciation for safe drinking water serves as motivation for us to work together to ensure the future quality and quantity of this precious resource. It doesn't matter if you're from rural Iowa or living in a suburban dream home, we all have a stake and a role in keeping our water supplies safe, clean and dependable for generations to come.

WATER FACTS

- 1. Water exists in a closed system; it is neither created nor destroyed. The water we drink today was here when the dinosaurs roamed the earth.
- 2. The earth contains approximately 326 million cubic miles of water-more than 97.5 percent of which is salt water. Of the remaining usable fresh water, 68 percent makes up glaciers and other ice that, theoretically, isn't supposed to melt. Another 30 percent of our limited fresh water is underground. If you're keeping track, this means we only have approximately 300 cubic miles of water to safely drink, bathe, water your lawn and fill your Super Soaker with. And, you have to share it with the other 6.8 billion people on the planet.
- 3. Everything you touch throughout the day requires water to grow, manufacture and process. It takes 1,800 gallons of water to make a pair of jeans; almost 40.000 gallons to build a car (if you want the tires too); and 35 gallons to brew a single cup of coffee.
- 4. As of May 25, 2016, some 19 states reported at least moderate drought issues, according to the National Drought Mitigation Center. lowa was not one of them.
- 5. A half-liter of bottled water, say Aguafina for example, retails for as much as \$2 (often more at a sporting event), while a liter of tap water costs less than a penny.


MAINTAINING THE CITY'S UNDERGROUND SEWERS

Inspecting The Sewer System

Since the mid 1990s, work on the City sewer network is recorded in a database that tracks every time work or maintenance is done on a sewer pipe, manhole or any portion of our underground sewer system. The City's sanitary sewers are divided into zones and maintenance is scheduled on a rotating basis. Cleaning of the underground pipes is scheduled every 3-5 years and televising every 8 years.



▲ This is the camera that is inserted through a manhole to travel the pipe and take videos for inspection.



As the video camera is traversing the sewer pipe, another crew member performs a PACP inspection from the video inside the camera truck.



When you see this camera truck sitting on a street, you know that City sewer in the area is being videoed for inspection.

Cleaning the Sewer System

As you've traveled West Des Moines streets, have you ever seen this large City vehicle? Trained staff use this valuable piece of equipment to perform a very important task in maintaining our infrastructure - cleaning the City's underground sewer system.

- 1. Before the crew heads out, they fill the on-board 2,400-gallon tank with water.
- 2. The sewer drain cover in the street is removed.



3. A nozzle is attached to the end of the hose and carefully inserted into the sewer.

Pressurized water sends the nozzle through the sewer, cleaning the surfaces as it goes. The nozzle is slowly brought back to the point of entry while it continues to spray and direct the debris toward the entry. Sewers are cleaned in a downhill sequence, which allows gravity to assist in bringing the debris to the sewer cleaning machine where it is vacuumed for proper disposal.

The City's underground sanitary and storm sewer system is worth hundreds of millions of dollars!

EXPLORING History THROUGH Recipes

Being a pioneer wife and feeding a large family in the 1850's was no easy task. James C. Jordan was a cattle farmer so we know that there was no shortage of beef at the Jordan House. Most likely there were chickens for meat and

eggs for extra money. There was probably an orchard and a vegetable garden with corn, wheat and potatoes. Canning fruit and vegetables and preserving meat took

place from late summer to October. In the 1850's Jordan House kitchen, James' wife Melinda (and later, his second wife Cynthia) prepared meals for the family. The kitchen was lit with a brass candlestick and a Betty lamp lit by

whale oil or lard. Rags served as wicks for the oil lamps.

Here are several popular recipes of the pioneer times:

JOHNNYCAKES

The Jordans most likely enjoyed johnnycakes, which have been popular since the 1600s.

Bring 1 cup water to boil in saucepan. Combine 1 1/2 cups cornmeal, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup boiled water, and 1/2 cup milk in bowl. Stir. Melt 2 Tablespoons butter in skillet over medium heat. Pour 1 Tablespoon of batter into skillet. Cook over medium heat 4 to 5 minutes on each side. Turn gently with

spatula. Serve hot with molasses or maple syrup and butter. Makes about 15 johnnycakes.

APPLES

Apples were probably plentiful on the Jordan farm.

Wash and peel 5 cooking apples. Remove core and seeds but do not peel. Cut into 16 narrow wedges. In skillet, melt butter, add apples, cover and

> cook 5 minutes. Add 4 Tablespoons brown sugar and 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg. Stir. Cook 10-12 minutes or until apples are tender.

SWEET POTATO

PUDDING

Sweet potatoes were a treat when no other sweet food was available. Often, sweet potatoes were mashed to make pudding or pies.

Peel and wash potatoes. Put potatoes in saucepan and cover with water. Bring to boil and turn heat to low. Cook 30 minutes. Drain water. Put in 350 degree oven. Mash potatoes with masher or fork. Beat 2 eggs in a bowl with a fork. Add eggs, 1 cup milk, 1/2 cup molasses, and 1 teaspoon cinnamon. Stir to mix. Bake 30 minutes in a baking dish. Makes 6-8 servings.

FALL YARD WASTE DISPOSAL Q & A



Welcome to Fall! Mother Nature's way of reminding us that Iowa is beautiful, and yes, it's time to get serious about fall yard work.

Curbside collection of yard waste through the Compost It! program ends Dec. 2, which gives you ample time to rake leaves, prune bushes and get rid of spent annuals and garden debris. Before you get to work outside, find answers to top yard waste disposal questions that'll make your fall yard work a breeze.

Q. If I buy a yard waste bag, do I also need a sticker?

A. Just remember, the "Compost It!" name pays for the cost of collection. If you purchase a bag that says "Compost It!," you do not need a sticker. If you purchase generic store-brand bags, you need to buy and attach a green Compost It! sticker to each bag.

Q. Where can I buy yard waste bags and/or stickers and how much do they cost?

A. Compost It! bags and stickers are available for purchase at many local grocery, convenience or hardware stores. A list of retailers is available at WhereItShouldGo.com/ yardwaste. A bundle of five Compost It! brand bags costs \$8 plus tax. The cost of store-brand bags varies. Green Compost It! stickers are \$1.25 each.

Q. When should I set my yard waste at the curb for collection?

A. Yard waste is picked up on your regular garbage day. Set out all material before 7 a.m. to ensure collection. Call ASI at 515-964-5229 to report collection related issues.

Q. What if I have branches that don't fit in the bag?

A. Bundle your brush and branches, and attach a green Compost It! sticker to each. Bundles cannot exceed 18 inches in diameter or four feet in length.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE DISPOSAL

If you're clearing out your garage before cooler weather hits, you may be faced with leftover summer products like pool chemicals, fertilizer or deck stain. These are all considered hazardous and not your regular trash.

Some common year-round products are surprisingly hazardous too, such as motor oil, window cleaner and CFL light bulbs.

Protect your family and our environment by disposing of them safely. Take these products, and others, to a Metro Waste Authority Hazardous Waste Drop-Off, now with two convenient locations around the Metro.

CONFUSED ABOUT RECYCLING PLASTICS? DO THE TWIST.

The best way to know if a plastic is recyclable in your curbside cart is if it has a twist-off lid. That's it. Does the lid twist off the container? If yes, then toss it (with the lid on it) in your cart. This includes plastic containers like water and soda bottles, milk jugs, laundry detergent bottles, peanut butter and miracle whip jars and similar containers with twist-off lids.

If it doesn't have a twist-off lid, then it doesn't belong in your cart. This includes plastic bags, bubble wrap, toys, baskets, flower pots, garden hoses and other plastics without a twist-off lid. Many of these items can be reused, donated or recycled somewhere other than your curbside cart. Plastic bags, for example, can be taken back to many grocery and retail stores to be recycled.

Why Can't All Plastics Be Recycled?

There are two factors that determine what plastics are accepted in your cart. 1.) The plastic is able to be efficiently and accurately sorted at the recycling sorting facility. 2.) There must be a market demand for the type of plastic.

Not all plastics are created **equally.** There are thousands of different types of plastics, each with its own chemical composition. Melting points and manufacturing processes vary. In order to successfully recycle plastics, those with similar makeup must be separated from those that differ. Recycling facilities can't feasibly sort every type of plastic, so they must be selective and accept those that are the most common with the greatest demand for resale. Because the majority of containers with twist-off lids are made of highly desirable plastic, they help ensure a sustainable, successful recycling program.



The Curb It! recycling program has one exception to the twist-off **lid rule:** Yogurt and margarine tubs are accepted. Because market demand for this type of plastic is very low, only a small amount can be taken. Cottage cheese, sour cream and whipped topping containers are excluded because accepting too much of this "undesirable plastic" puts the program in jeopardy.

> What if the Container has the "Chasina Arrows" symbol?

You can toss out any previous knowledge of symbols and numbers. The "chasing arrows" symbol with the number inside -

usually located on the bottom of plastic containers - doesn't necessarily mean it's recyclable in your cart. It is a symbol adopted by the plastic industry years ago to identify the type of plastic.

Keep it easy and keep it fun. When it comes to plastic recycling, just do the twist.







New Name Selected for WEST DES MOINES COMMUNITY CENTER

The West Des Moines Community Center, located at 217 5th Street in Valley Junction, will now be called the **Valley** Junction Activity Center. The name was changed to better identify the building and avoid confusion between other facilities in the area.

The building was originally constructed in 1950-1951 as an American Legion Hall. In 1974, the WDM American Legion Drum and Bugle Corps., Inc., donated the building to the City of West Des Moines. The American Legion still holds their regular meetings in the building.

SCHOOL **CROSSING SAFETY**

SAFETY OF OUR CHILDREN GOING TO SCHOOL

It is time to begin thinking about school crossing safety as West Des Moines students return to school in August. Currently, there are 38 school crossings that serve 15 schools within the City of West Des Moines.

Cooperation among parents, students, motorists, schools, and public safety and engineering departments is crucial to the safety of children as they walk to and from school. It is important that each group is aware of their responsibility for maintaining safe routes to schools for children.

PARENTS



- Determine your child's safest route to school.
- Walk your children along this route several times prior to the start of fall classes and emphasize proper procedures for crossing the streets.
- When dropping off your children, unload on the school side of the street or where your child can cross the street at a designated crosswalk.

STUDENTS

- Use established school routes.
- Participate in bike, pedestrian, and bus safety programs provided by your school.
- Practice safe and proper pedestrian behavior at all times.

- Familiarize yourself with all local school areas and locations used by school children.
- Obey all school crossing controls and be particularly alert near any school area.
- Watch your speed in school zones.
- Respond immediately to any pedestrian accident, regardless of severity, by providing first aid if necessary and calling emergency services.



 Instruct the children on pedestrian safety, bicycle safety, and bus safety.

MOTORISTS (

- Develop a school route plan with transportation engineers.
- Periodically review routes with special attention given to conditions such as unsafe sidewalks, trees or bushes that obscure vision, and the need for speed limit enforcement.

- Demonstrate and instruct students on the safe way to cross streets.
- Provide training and supervision of crossing quards.
- Respond to emergency situations.
- Investigate and make recommendations on requests received from the school administrators and the engineering division.
- Assist in the development of a school route plan.
- Investigate and make recommendations on requests for school traffic control measures.
- Respond to inquiries regarding school traffic controls and develop a maintenance program for all traffic controls.

Keep Fire Safety In Mind When Heading Back To School

The beginning of a new school year means classes, homework, friends and activities. With such hectic schedules, fire safety can be the last thing on a student's mind. Most students do not realize how quickly a fire can occur. Studies show you have on average three minutes from when the first smoke detector sounds to escape. A large dorm fire last March at Loras College in Dubuque, Iowa reminds us of the importance of practicing fire safety in dorms, off-campus housing and at home.

In a recent U.S. Fire Administration (USFA) report from 2000 through 2015, 85 fatal fires occurred in dormitories, fraternities, sororities and off-campus housing, resulting in 118 student fatalities, an average of approximately seven per school year. In these fatal campus fires:

- 94% took place in off-campus housing
- 58% had no smoke detectors or the detectors did not have batteries
- 29% listed smoking as the leading cause
- 11% were electrical
- 9% involved cooking

The West Des Moines Fire Department would like to remind parents and students to remember these fire safety tips when heading off to college:

• Know your evacuation plan and practice all drills as if they were the real thing. Know two ways out of each room. Make sure all windows and doors open easily.

- Use a surge protector for your computer and other electrical devices. Plug the protector directly into an outlet. Do not overload electrical outlets.
- Stay in the kitchen at all times when cooking. Do not cook when tired or using alcohol.
- Use battery operated candles that don't produce a flame.
- Install smoke detectors inside each bedroom, outside every sleeping area and on each level.
- Never tamper with your room's smoke detector or remove the batteries.
- Test smoke alarms monthly and replace batteries once a year.
- Properly dispose of smoking materials in sturdy ashtrays. After parties, check the cushions on couches and chairs for smoldering cigarettes.
- · Purchase a fire extinguisher and learn how to use it before a fire breaks out.
- Install carbon monoxide detectors on every floor and near sleeping areas.
- Look for housing that is equipped with automatic fire sprinkler systems. Not every residence hall or rental property has them.

Students need to realize that they are not invincible, and they can take steps

to protect themselves, no **EVACUATION PLAN**

matter where they live. Simple measures like these will optimize student safety, and give parents one less thing to worry about.



FROM THE CITY MANAGER

I want to share our progress with several major initiatives we're working on to help ensure West Des Moines remains one of the most desirable cities in the region. Let's look at a few key indicators that tell us how we're doing.

It's no secret our community is growing rapidly. We know from our Special Census that our population has increased 12.2 percent since 2010, and that means we have more than 63,000 residents depending on us for essential City services.

In March of this year, contractors took out nearly \$445 million in permits for residential and commercial construction. That total is more than West Des Moines issued during the entire year in 2015, and while we have the Microsoft Data Centers to thank for much of that total, we're clearly a community that is attractive to potential residents and businesses.

With all this new development and growth comes the responsibility of meeting the needs of our residents. For the last year or more, City staff have been working on updating our strategic plan. We recently held three workshops with the City Council to discuss things we need to do to support the broad vision for our community contained in our WDM 2036 plan, which looks 20 years down the road in the future.

This action plan will serve as a guiding document for the next three years, and it contains things we want to accomplish to promote livability and make sure we're working together on community priorities. The plan also contains strategies to keep us financially strong. As this magazine goes to press, we're still prioritizing our work. Once the plan is finalized, I'll share our strategies with you.

As we look to the future, I'm pleased to report that we recently received a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting from the Government Finance Officers Association. The attainment of this Certificate represents a significant accomplishment by a government and its management.

This news came shortly after Moody's Investors Service announced the City would maintain its top Aaa stable credit rating. We're fortunate to have an outstanding team that is doing an excellent job of balancing our tremendous growth in a fiscally responsible manner. Our longstanding commitment to doing things the right way puts us in a strong position to attract additional quality development and continue as a regional retail and commercial center.

We're also implementing changes behind the scenes that will help us provide services more efficiently. Staff is in the process of transitioning to a new financial software that will save time and allow us to share information more easily. We've also taken steps to reorganize and work as a team across departments. I want to recognize Public Works, Engineering Services and Parks and Recreation for working together to share staff and equipment so that we can make the most of our resources to maintain our parks, streets and sewers.

In addition, code enforcement has moved from the Police Department to Public Works, and effective with this move, we're now calling it community compliance. Staff will continue to handle nuisances such as junk cars and weeds and grass over 10 inches or more. This move makes sense because it complements the work Public Works employees do every day when they are out in the community working on streets, sidewalks and potholes. If you have a compliance issue to report, please call Public Works at 222-3480 from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday.

All these changes are necessary and a direct result of our growth and shared commitment to delivering the services you need in the most efficient way possible. It's an exciting time to live and work in West Des Moines!




