n February 21, the City Council approved the proposed budget for FY 2017–18. The adoption of the budget is the most important action taken by any City's elected officials each year.

The Council approved maintaining the property tax levy rate for residents at \$12.00 per \$1,000 of taxable valuation. The tax levy was lowered from \$12.05 to \$12.00 in 2015, and has not increased since July 1, 2007. West Des Moines has the third lowest tax rate among lowa's ten largest cities.

The FY 2017-18 budget is comprised of basic operating expenditures totaling approximately \$72.9 million, business/proprietary expenses of

\$37.7 million, debt service expenditures of \$21.5 million and capital improvement expenditures of \$116.1 million. These expenditures amount to a total budget of nearly \$248.2 million. I want to thank our elected officials for their leadership and their commitment to West Des Moines. I also want to thank our employees for their outstanding work on behalf of our residents.

WDM EMS launches first Stop the Bleed program in Iowa

A news conference was recently held in the Council Chambers at City Hall to announce a new partnership to bring the first Stop the Bleed program

to lowa. This national initiative was launched by the Department of Homeland Security to train and equip people who find themselves in an emergency

with a person experiencing serious bleeding.

The West Des Moines Emergency Medical Services Department, UnityPoint Health-Des Moines Trauma Services, Mercy Des Moines Trauma Services and The Iowa Clinic will work to equip residents with the knowledge and tools (tourniquets, bandages and gloves) to stop life-threatening bleeding.

Jeff Dumermuth, Chief of Emergency Medical Services for WDM, said the group's goal is to offer training to citizens and businesses in West Des Moines as part of their public education initiatives. "We hope the skills that control bleeding will become as widely known as the skills of CPR and using an automated defibrillator," he said.

The initial organizations participating in the program are Guide One Insurance, Jordan Creek

Richard Sidwell, MD, Trauma Surgeon with The Iowa Clinic and Iowa Methodist Medical Center/Blank Children's Hospital, said the program will improve the public's awareness and increase access to bleeding control kits.

"This awareness and training can truly mean the difference between life and death," he said.

While the Stop the Bleed partnership is currently focused on West Des Moines, officials hope to expand the program throughout the area.

Yard Waste Collection begins April 3

The season for yard work is almost upon us! Curbside yard waste collection starts the week of **April 3** and continues through November. Yard waste cannot be disposed of in your normal garbage. Residents have the option to use Compost It! bags, stickers or carts. The Compost It! name pays for the cost of collection.

Bags

If you put yard waste into a Compost It! brand bag, no sticker is required. Do not exceed 40 lbs. of material per bag. Bags are sold for \$8.00 per bundle of five, and you can find them at most grocery and hardware stores.

Stickers



If you're using a generic compost bag, attach a Compost It! Sticker and make sure the sticker is visible to the hauler from the street. Compost It! stickers should also be attached to brush bundles. Bundles cannot exceed 18 inches in diameter or four feet

in length. Stickers are sold for \$1.25 and are also available at most grocery and hardware stores.



Carts

If you regularly have a lot of yard waste, a Compost It! cart could be the solution for you. The cart is 96 gallons and can hold the equivalent of three yard waste bags. If you purchase more than 65 bags a year,

or simply don't want to hassle with bags, the cart is a nice alternative.



Carts are available for a \$105 annual service fee, plus a one-time cart purchase of \$60 (\$80 with delivery) to begin the program.

Community Compliance Corner: Tips for Property Owners

1) Satellite dishes must be attached to the house or apartment or be placed in the backyard. If you need to place your dish in the front or side yard, you must get approval from the City of West Des Moines and pull a permit.



- 2) Garbage, recycling and extra ticketed items should only be placed out in the right of way after 5 p.m. the night before pickup. Carts should be removed within 24 hours after scheduled pickup.
- 3) Vehicles on any private property (including single family homes, apartment complexes, commercial properties or others) must be currently licensed, operable and parked on an approved hard surface.
- 4) Yard waste is not collected during the winter, but collection will begin again the week of April 3rd. Residents should not place yard waste in the right of way until collection officially begins. Large piles of branches and other yard waste should be hauled to the Metro Park East Landfill.

Snow events require all vehicles to be parked on private property and off City streets during the entirety of the Snow Emergency Parking Ban.

Sidewalks must be cleared within 24 hours from the end of the snow event.
