The regular meeting of the West Des Moines Public Arts Advisory Commission was called to order on Thursday, October 27, 2022, at 5:30 p.m. by Chair Brenda Sedlacek.

### On Item 1. Approval of Agenda

Phillips moved to approve the agenda as presented. Luther seconded. Motion carried, 5 ayes.

### On Item 2. Citizen Forum

No report.

### On Item 3. Approval of Minutes of September 22, 2022 Meeting

Phillips moved to approve the minutes as presented. Boyd seconded. Motion carried, 6 ayes.

### On Item 4. Old Business

No report.

### **New Business**

### On Item 5A. Motion – Approval of Public Art Master Plan (2023-2027)

Mathrubutham moved to approve the Public Art Master Plan as presented. Luther seconded. Motion carried, 6 ayes.

Boyd recommended including Lynette Pohlman's title, "Director and Chief Curator of Iowa State Museums".

Boyd moved to amend the Public Art Master Plan to include the title change. Phillips seconded. Motion carried, 6 ayes. Boyd thanked the Commission for their efforts in developing the Master Plan.

### On Item 5B. Motion – Approval of Recommendation to City Council – FY 23-24 Public Art Fund Budget

Ortgies provided an overview of the FY Public Art Budget. The Executive Committee agreed to adjust the maintenance fund to follow the city code by increasing it to 10% of the permanent collection which is currently valued at over \$1 million. Phillips suggested that the value of an art

piece should be determined just on the cost of fabrication and not include the community engagement expense.

It was recommended to remove expenses towards Art on the Campus Opening and reduce the amount for Unexpected Opportunities to \$10,000. The Exhibition Committee agreed to add two more mural locations to the WDMural exhibit. After factoring in the two additions and the cost of painting and pressure washing, there would be an increase of \$6,000 this year. Ortgies stated that when planning for the next large, commissioned art piece, the \$100,000 would be split between two fiscal years and the budget for consulting would remain in place if needed. Ullestad stated that temporary art expenses have increased to approximately 40% of the annual budget. The Commission will need to consider whether the limited funds are better spent on temporary or permanent commissioned art pieces.

Ortgies discussed a couple of upcoming revenue opportunities. The BRAVO Public Art Grant, estimated at \$25,000, could potentially be applied to the Raccoon River Park sensory wall project. Another revenue opportunity would be to request an additional \$30,000 from Council increasing the Hotel/Motel Tax funding to \$150,000. This has not changed in 11 years. Sedlacek agreed to present the proposal to Council during the same meeting as the Public Art Master Plan and Annual Written Report.

Phillips moved to approve the recommendation to City Council – FY 23-24 Public Art Fund Budget as presented. Mathrubutham seconded. Motion carried, 6 ayes.

On Item 5C. Motion – Approval of 2023 Art on the Campus Selection Committee
Ullestad stated that there were a few changes to the Selection Committee. It will now include
Mahesh Mathrubutham (Commissioner, Year 1), Brenda Sedlacek (Commissioner, Year 2), Suzzanne
Allen (Citizen, Year 1), Shirley Houghtaling (Citizen, Year 2), and David Basler (Citizen, Year 2).

Boyd moved to approve the 2023 Art on the Campus Selection Committee as presented. Luther seconded. Motion carried, 6 ayes.

On Item 5D. Motion – Establish November/December Meeting Date – November 9, 2022 Sedlacek stated that there will be a motion to approve Art on the Campus Artists and the WDMurals Call for Artists at that meeting.

Phillips moved to approve the November/December Meeting Date – November 9, 2022. Mathrubutham seconded. Motion carried, 6 ayes.

### On Item 6C. Exhibition Committee

Luther stated that two mural locations will be added next year due to the public survey results. The budget for the WDMurals will increase by \$6,000 as mentioned earlier. The Exhibition Committee discussed the Hello, River project and reviewed a list of questions that need to be addressed before a decision can be made by the Commission.

### **Project Work Group Reports**

### On Item 7A. Railroad Park Restrooms Public Art

Ortgies stated that the work group has not been able to meet. Ullestad mentioned that enough surveys have been completed to give the work group a place to start forming ideas.

### On Item 7B. DART Bus Shelter Public Art

Ullestad stated that the work group hasn't met.

### On Item 7C. Raccoon River Park Playground Public Art

Mathrubutham and Ullestad explained that the work group is formulating a concept that meets the needs of both sensory-seeking and sensory-avoidant individuals. Kevin Conn, Parks and Recreation Landscape Architect, gave a presentation on the plans for the playground. The next meeting will be establishing an artist statement and RFQ/Call to Artist. The artist will need to have an awareness of how art and functionality of the piece come together.

### **Staff Reports**

### On Item 8A. Arts, Culture & Enrichment Supervisor

Ullestad mentioned that *Confluence* has been installed in front of City Hall and a plaque will be added soon. Ullestad created a booklet showcasing the permanent public art collection which will also be located on the website as a digital book. Sedlacek suggested bringing the booklets to Council when proposing the increased funding.

### On Item 8B. Director of Parks and Recreation

Ortgies announced her retirement on March 31st after 34 years with the Parks and Recreation Department.

### **WDMurals Overview**

The West Des Moines Public Arts Advisory Commission and Parks and Recreation Department invite lowa artists to submit a Mural Proposal to participate in the 3rd annual WDMurals public art exhibit. WDMurals is a temporary, outdoor exhibit that includes murals painted on the entrance and exit walls of underpasses along trails in West Des Moines.

### **Exhibit Details**



- A Best in Show mural will be selected and publicized. The selected mural will remain in place for one year after the end of the current A selection panel will blind-score mural proposals to choose **9 original artist/artist group mural proposals.** 
  - year's exhibit. The Best in Show artist/artist group will receive a \$300 award.
    - The WDMurals exhibit will be promoted on-site and in the local media\*. Marketing efforts will include but not be limited to:
      - 1. An identification plaque listing the artist name(s), mural title, and mural description will be placed at each mural site
        - An article in WDM Magazine (direct mailed to all WDM households and businesses)
          - 3. News and information on the City of WDM website (www.wdm.iowa.gov)
- 4. WDM Parks and Recreation Department's Facebook and Instagram accounts
- The WDMurals exhibit is a listed feature on the Otocast app, a mobile audio guide. Selected artists are required to work with Otocast staff to record a short narrative about their mural.

\*The City of West Des Moines reserves the right to photograph and reproduce images of the murals on exhibit for promotional and educational purposes.

### Installation of Artwork

Artists are responsible for all supplies, equipment, and labor necessary for the installation of their mural. Care must be taken to ensure the safety of trail users during installation.



### **Mural Criteria**

All proposed murals must be the original work of the artist in concept, composition, and execution. Artists' proposals will be selected by a selection panel\* comprised of WDM Public Arts Advisory Commission members and local citizens, artists, and/or business representatives. The following criteria will be used in the selection process:



Mural proposals that speak to the theme of "Our Community"

Artists are asked to include an artist statement describing their artistic interpretation of the theme in the mural proposals

Mural proposals that are suitable for public viewing

Mural proposals that create a sense of discovery, surprise, imagination, and emotional connection

Mural proposals that are aesthetically and photographically pleasing

Murals must be created using only spray, acrylic based, and/or exterior paint

\*Decisions by the selection panel are final and not open to negotiation. To support an authentic, rich, and diverse arts culture for all, the West. Des Moines Public Arts Advisory Commission commits to championing policies and practices of cultural equity that empower a vibrantly diverse, inclusive, equitable community.

### **Submission Details**



There is no limit to the number of mural proposals submitted by an artist.

1-4 full-color sketches or design concepts using the relative dimensions at the bottom of page 4 are required per mural proposal submitted. (5 MB max; .gif, .jpg, .png, .doc, .docx, .xls, .xlsx, .rtf, .pdf, .txt)





ITEM: Motion - Approval of Artists and Artwork Locations - 2023 Art on the Campus

**FINANCIAL IMPACT:** Expense of \$24,000 for the artist stipends (\$2,000 per work of art) and \$500 for the People's Choice Award for a total of \$24,500. This amount is included in the FY 22-23 budget.

**SYNOPSIS:** The Commission is sponsoring the 11th temporary "Art on the Campus" exhibit from April 15, 2023, to November 15, 2023. An "Art on the Campus" selection committee meeting was held on Thursday, November 3, to review and score 26 proposals that were submitted by 13 artists from Iowa (6), Illinois (3), Nebraska (2), and Missouri (2). Of the 13 artists, three were new and ten were returning artists

The selection committee members included: Brenda Sedlacek (Commission member), Mahesh Mathrubutham (Commission member), David Basler (Citizen), Shirley Houghtaling (Citizen), and Suzanne Allen (Citizen).

Twelve entries were selected to be temporarily installed around the pond on the city campus. The committee's recommendations include:

**FINANCIAL IMPACT:** Expense of \$75,000 from the FY22-23 Public Art Fund – Commissioned Work of Art #4

**SYNOPSIS:** A Request for Artist Qualifications has been developed by the Raccoon River Park Playground Public Art Sensory Wall Project Work Group for a permanent work of art to be sited on public property within the confines of the Raccoon River Park playground site plan. The Request for Artist Qualifications is attached for review, but highlights of the main elements include the following:

### **Art Statement**

Raccoon River Park, located at 2500 Grand Avenue in West Des Moines, lowa, was established in the late 1990s and has become the city's most visible and highly used park. Park amenities include a 232-acre lake, beach, shelters, boathouse, archery facility, dog park, nature lodge, multi-use trail, fishing pier, softball and soccer complexes, and large playground. Two public artworks, Even Water and Aqua Strata, can be found in the park and were commissioned by the Public Arts Advisory Commission within the past four years to inform park users of effective water quality practices and their impact on the natural environment. Raccoon River Park is heavily used by thousands of visitors each year. Because of this, the original playground equipment began to show signs of age and wear and came to the end of its useful life when it was removed in the fall of 2022.

A new, inclusive playground is currently being constructed, and plans feature improvements that will welcome children and families of all abilities to learn, play, and grow together. The playground will enable all children to develop physically, cognitively, socially, and emotionally. A **commissioned sensory wall that incorporates public art** will be a focal point of the playground. The sensory wall will encourage visitors of all ages and development levels to feel comfortable, relaxed, and welcome in the park.

The West Des Moines Public Arts Advisory Commission and Raccoon River Park Playground Public Art Work Group want every person who experiences the artwork to feel invited and welcomed to the park. It is of the utmost importance that the public art sensory wall is playful and accessible for and to all. The Commission and Work Group want the public art sensory wall to be part of a calming space that provides a respite from other playground activities. In addition, the artwork should complement and relate to the natural elements of the park.

The project will include a permanent commissioned work of sensory art to be sited on public property within the confines of the Raccoon River Park Playground site plan [see attached renderings]. The work of art will be a single piece made up of multiple interactive elements.

### **Project Budget**

The total budget for the project is \$75,000. This not-to-exceed total must cover all design fees, fabrication, installation, site visits, and other related expenses as defined by contract,

Proposed Schedule Installation October 2023

### **Artist Eligibility**

Lead artist must have completed one commissioned outdoor public works of art of \$25,000 or more; must show an understanding of neurodiverse populations and accessibility design best practices; must demonstrate the ability to work within playground safety standards and guidelines; can reside anywhere in the continental United States; must be able to travel to West Des Moines if selected.

**BACKGROUND**: Staff has been planning the replacement of the large playground in Raccoon River Park which is over 20 years old. During planning, the incorporation of art into the playground was discussed. The Commission approved commissioning a public art sensory wall to be included in the playground construction on May 26, 2022. Funding for the playground (excluding the public art sensory wall) is budgeted in the Capital Improvement Program, and construction began the week of October 24, 2022.

The Raccoon River Park Playground Public Art Sensory Wall Project Work Group has met two times. Members include Diane Boyd (Commissioner), Mahesh Mathrubutham (Commissioner), Ryan Penning (Assistant Director of Parks and Recreation), Melissa Clarke-Wharff (Co-Founder, Can Play), Kelly Kunzler (Artist in Residence for The Least of These Foundation and Kunzler Studios), Rachel Bussan (WDM Library; neurodivergent), and Kristine Dreckman (parent of a neurodivergent child).

**RECOMMENDATION:** The Raccoon River Park Playground Public Art Sensory Wall Project Work Group recommends that the Commission approve the attached Request for Artist Qualifications.

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

### **ABOUT WEST DES MOINES**

The City of West Des Moines, Iowa, is a rapidly growing community located within the Des Moines/West Des Moines Metropolitan Area. West Des Moines has a wide array of amenities and services and provides residents with broad access to a high quality of life. A recent ETC Institute survey found that 94% of West Des Moines residents are satisfied with the quality of life, and overall satisfaction with City services is 42% above the national average.

The vision of the West Moines Public Art Program is the creation of a diverse collection of public works of art of high aesthetic and intellectual quality and excellence along with a program that promotes cultural expression and artistic appreciation. At the heart of the aspiration for public art in West Des Moines is the wish for an authentic, rich, and diverse arts culture that is seen and understood as uniquely arising from the community – an arts culture that benefits and enriches all those who live in, work in, and visit West Des Moines.

The mission of the West Des Moines Public Art Program is to create a city with enriching public spaces incorporating public works of art that offer moments of discovery and opportunities for reflection and growth--a city with public art woven into the fine-grain detail of the public infrastructure. The Public Art Program and Collection should be the most visible symbols of West Des Moines' commitment to creativity, diversity of ideas and expression, and socio-cultural multiplicity. A creative city provides inclusive and equitable environments for its residents, business communities, and visitors, extending opportunities for life-long learning and community connection.

### ABOUT THIS OPPORTUNITY

Raccoon River Park Playground Public Art Sensory Wall Project Art Statement

Raccoon River Park, located at 2500 Grand Avenue in West Des Moines, Iowa, was established in the late 1990s and has become the city's most visible and highly used park. Park amenities include a 232-acre lake, beach, shelters, boathouse, archery facility, dog park, nature lodge, multi-use trail, fishing pier, softball and soccer complexes, and large playground. Two public artworks, *Even Water* and *Aqua Strata*, can be found in the park and were commissioned by the Public Arts Advisory Commission within the past four years to inform park users of effective water quality practices and their impact on the natural environment. Raccoon River Park is heavily used by thousands of visitors each year. Because of this, the original playground equipment began to show signs of age and wear and came to the end of its useful life when it was removed in the fall of 2022.

A new, inclusive playground is currently being constructed, and plans feature improvements that will welcome children and families of all abilities to learn, play, and grow together. The playground will enable all children to develop physically, cognitively, socially, and emotionally. A **commissioned sensory wall that incorporates public art** will be a focal point of the playground. The sensory wall will encourage visitors of all ages and development levels to feel comfortable, relaxed, and welcome in the park.

The West Des Moines Public Arts Advisory Commission and Raccoon River Park Playground Public Art Work Group want every person who experiences the artwork to feel invited and welcomed to the park. It is of the utmost importance that the public art sensory wall is playful and accessible for and to all. The Commission and Work Group want the public art sensory wall to be part of a calming space that provides a respite from other playground activities. In addition, the artwork should complement and relate to the natural elements of the park.

The project will include a permanent commissioned work of sensory art to be sited on public property within the confines of the Raccoon River Park Playground site plan [see attached renderings]. The work of art will be a single piece made up of multiple interactive elements.

The total budget for the project is \$75,000. This not-to-exceed total must cover all design fees, fabrication, installation, site visits, and other related expenses as defined by contract.

### ELIGIBILITY

### Invited artist or artist team:

- Must have completed one commissioned outdoor public work of art of \$25,000 or more
- · Must show an understanding of neurodiverse populations and accessibility design best practices
- Must demonstrate the ability to work within playground safety standards and guidelines
- Can reside anywhere in the continental United States
- Must be able to travel to West Des Moines if selected

### **SELECTION & PROJECT CRITERIA**

Selection of a finalist or finalists will be based on the following criteria:

- Quality of letter of interest
- · Quality of work samples
- · Ability of artist/team to complete the project based on bio and prior work experience

### SELECTION & PROJECT CRITERIA CONT.

Approval of artwork proposed by the selected artist will be based on the following criteria:

- Fulfills the Raccoon River Park Playground Public Art Statement [see above]
- Must be a single artwork with multiple sensory elements; interactive and engaging with kinetic, tactile, and colorful elements
- · Must adhere to current ASTM and CPSC playground safety standards and guidelines
- Must be low maintenance and durable, able to withstand weather conditions
- Must be site-specific; installed on public property within the confines of the Raccoon River Park Playground site plan
- Installed on pre-poured frost [3'6" deep] footing to be provided by City's playground contractor; exact footing location and dimensions to be coordinated with City and contractor prior to final design proposal
- Includes a high level of community engagement that is incorporated into the development of a final proposal and/or the artwork itself

### **SELECTION PROCESS OVERVIEW**

This is an open request for qualifications for artists who meet the eligibility requirements. Artists' materials will be pre-screened to ensure all applicants meet eligibility requirements. The Work Group will review eligible applications and select up to three finalists/finalist teams to participate in an interview. Interviews will be held virtually. Further interview information will be provided to the finalists.

Upon completion of an interview, one artist/artist team will be commissioned to develop, fabricate, and install the permanent artwork. Additional requirements will be outlined in instructions to finalists. Please see the following timeline for further details.
