### Pet safety tips from the WDM Fire Department

Plan ahead to keep your pets and your home safe!

Did you know that about 1,000 home fires are started accidentally by pets each year in the United States?

The WDM Fire Department would like you to think about how you can take steps to prevent your pets from accidentally starting a fire and how to keep them safe in case of a fire.

Extinguish Open Flames – Pets are generally curious and will investigate cooking appliances, candles, or even a fire in your fireplace. Ensure your pet is not left unattended around an open flame and make sure to thoroughly extinguish any open flame before leaving your home.

**Pet Proof the Home** – Learn the habits of your pets. Do they chew on cords, run across the counters, etc.

Take a walk around your home and look for areas where pets might start fires inadvertently, such as the stove knobs, loose wires, candles, and other potential hazards.

Secure Young Pets – Especially with young puppies, keep them confined away from potential fire-starting hazards when you are away from home.



**Keep Pets Near Entrances** – When leaving pets home alone, keep them in areas or rooms near entrances where firefighters can easily find them.

Practice Your Evacuation Plan with Pets – Discuss your family evacuation plan and designate someone to carry out the pets. Keep collars and leashes at the ready in case you must evacuate quickly with your pet. Never go back inside for pets in a fire. Tell firefighters if your pet is trapped.

<u>Smart 9-1-1 and add your pets to the profile</u> so we have that information before we reach your home.

- Never leave your pet in a vehicle, even for a few minutes.
- The temperature inside a parked car may hit 100 degrees within minutes, so just a "10-minute" can be fatal to your pet.
- Opening the windows a few inches doesn't provide enough cooling air to your pet.
- If you're running errands, leave your pet at home.
- If traveling, make your pit stops at places where your pet can go out of the vehicle and remain in a cool spot and has access to water.





All pet owners must be aware of the dangers of leaving pets in vehicles! Not only can a hot car lead to heatstroke

and dehydration, but it can also have serious legal repercussions.

Pets are unable to regulate body temperature like humans and are highly susceptible to heat-related illnesses when exposed to high temperatures. If the breeze is not cool enough and it's hot outside, pets may struggle to maintain their temperature, putting them at risk of serious health issues and even death.


It is essential for pet owners to understand criminal charges may be brought against anyone whose pets suffer or pass away due to being left in a hot vehicle. It is your duty to ensure the safety and well-being of your animal companions. Always provide pets with access to shade, water, and a cool environment during hot weather. Remember, your pets depend on you for their safety and happiness!

### English Language Learner (ELL) classes resume this fall

English Language Learner (ELL) classes will resume this fall at West Des Moines Human Services. These free classes are designed to teach adults of limited English proficiency how to read, write, and speak the English language.

The classes focus on the fundamental elements of the English language (e.g., spelling, vocabulary, verb tense, grammar). Students are divided into beginning, intermediate and advanced lev-

els. The level of instruction is determined by assessment scores. The classes take place on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10 a.m. to noon in ten-week sessions. The next session begins on September 10th.
